Supporting Children During Drought

Try to look after yourself

Parents play a vital role for children in times of drought. Your capacity to cope during drought impacts your children's response to stress and their wellbeing during and after the event. Selfcare is vital so it is important that you seek out any help you need so you are better able to support your kids.

Try looking at things through your child's eyes

If possible, try to imagine the drought from your child's point of view. This may help you to understand some of their reactions and behaviours. It may also assist connecting and supporting them.

Keep an open conversation

Let your children know that you are available to talk with them when needed. Encouraging children to talk about their feelings will help them understand their experiences.

Sometimes children don't have the words to describe their feelings, however you can reassure them that their feelings are normal and that they will come and go.

Be on the look out for changes in your child's behaviour

At times of stress, children can respond in different ways. While most have a natural resilience, a minority of children will find the impacts of drought more difficult to deal with. If you are concerned about your child, it may be helpful to link them in with additional support.

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Support your child's social connections

Children need positive time spent with family, friends and doing activities they enjoy. Most of all, they need time to be kids, which includes regular routines at home and school.

Give your child the opportunity to make decisions,

Drought is notable for the sense of powerlessness It creates, which is why giving children choices and asking their or inions, can help them feel more empowered and positive.

The Fathering Project is a research/evidence based, not-for-profit organisation, which simply wants to help Dad's and Father figures spend some quality time together with their Kids.

As Fathers and Father figures, it's easy to get lost in our other roles and forget what our first job is. Yet, it's the most important job we'll ever have, because what we do, or don't do as Dads, has an enormous impact on the happiness and health of the kids we love.

Together, we can help build resilience, self-respect and emotional intelligence in our kids. We can show boys how men should treat women. We can show girls how good men behave, and how they can encourage males. In addition, we can give our kids a great deal of self-worth, just by showing up and being there.

The Fathering Project aims to positively promote the important role of Fathers, and Father figures, through a handful of small events normally within the school. Two of those being simple Dad and Kids events like Paper Planes and Pizza nights, and two being Dads only nights. The Dads only nights are also designed to be fun, informal but informative, and are non-threatening. We will never be there to tell you that 'you are doing it wrong or that you are a bad father'. We simply talk about what fathering is about and encourage each other along the way. What we will use is information which has come from reputable research, to help guide us in our journey as an effective Father or Father figure.

Everyone benefits when there is an engaged and effective Father or Father figure in a child's life. We know that an effective Father or Father figure has an enormous impact on the happiness and health of the kids they love.

An effective and engaged Father or Father figure helps to:

- Enhance a child's development and improve academic progress
- Reduce school adjustment problems
- Reduce alcohol, tobacco, drug use, and risky behaviour
- Increase physical activity and better health outcomes
- Increase social responsibility, social maturity, resilience and life skills
- Strengthen father-child and father-wife/partner relationships
